

Fun Stuff

Periodically, I'll have a <u>Scuttlebutt</u> column dedicated to the Helpful--Wild--and Wacky means of repairing cars. You may just learn something, or you may have a good laugh. Some of the ideas are great-----some are outright dangerous and I don't recommend trying them at home.

But first you need a little history.

How Did You Maintain your Car in "Days of Yore"?

For the early car owner, there were no auto repair businesses. If the owner himself could not maintain his vehicle, he would seek out a bicycle mechanic, machinist, plumber or blacksmith to repair or fabricate parts.

Wealthier car owners employed chauffeur/mechanics as servants who would drive and maintain their vehicles. These employees were much more independent than the carriage drivers and footmen they replaced. They used their specialized knowledge to gain better pay and privileges from their employers.

By the twenties, motorized vehicles were more common. Ford's began mass production and manufacturers started using standard interchangeable parts. A budding industry in vehicle repair began. Some were independent companies or service shops, while others were dealerships for a specific automotive maker. Mechanics were paid by the hour or day, and repairs were billed for the actual time taken. Repair shops with good mechanics had a big advantage as repairs were quicker and therefore cheaper. Even within the same shop, which mechanic was assigned to a job could make a big difference in the cost. In an effort to stabilize the market, standard times for set repair jobs started to be used for billing.

My Father's job at the Ford garage was as a "tester". He was a master mechanic whose task was to talk to the customer, drive the car and then tell the mechanic what to repair. He told me that, rather than paying a guaranteed daily wage, many employers split any labor charges 50% / 50% with their mechanics. Mechanics might spend their time sitting on benches, waiting and hoping for work. If the customer brought the car back because it was not repaired properly, the mechanic had to repair it again--without pay.

Many automobile owners learned to make their own repairs. Remember, they didn't have a Snyder's to call for parts, and many of the specialized tools weren't readily available either. So, what would you do? You turned to the "Do it yourself" books, written under titles such as Short cuts in Auto Repairing, and Auto Kinks. I have had fun reading these books over the years. I'll be using these as a reference. Watch for your next Scuttlebutt and maybe you'll learn something different.

First Tip

To determine the firing order of cylinders before removing the head, and when you do not wish to go to the trouble of watching the valve action: Remove all the spark plugs and put corks in their places. Turn the motor over slowly by hand and the corks will pop out of the spark plug holes one by one in the firing order.

A radiator plaque is awarded at the completion of 2000 miles, and a replacement mileage tab is awarded at 5000 miles and at each 5000 miles thereafter.
