The Chief's **Corner**


Hello Everyone!

America's Packard Museum was founded in 1992 by Dayton attorney and long-time car collector Bob Signom. Located in an original Packard dealership building constructed in 1917, the museum has officially taken the name of the original dealership - The Citizens Motorcar Company - but has become known as "America's Packard Museum". Car Collector



magazine named the museum one of the "Top Ten" Auto Museums in The United States. The museum features over 50 automobiles on display in the restored Art Deco showroom, service department and pavilion. In addition, significant artifacts from the Packard Motorcar Company are on display. This is sure to be a tour packed full of beautiful cars that you won't want to miss.




He's All Tied Up In Knots

For each 4-H project category, the Ohio State University Extension publishes a project book. These how-to guides go out to youths across the state and, in some cases, are picked up for use by Extension offices in other states.

Madison County resident Monroe Harbage helped to author one such book, "Not Just Knots", a guide to tying all sorts of knots. Harbage has served as a knots judge at the Ohio State Fair for 15 years. He also is Madison County's 4-H key leader for industrial arts projects.

"There are three of us who have served as state judges for years and years, and we never liked the knot book we had. We thought we could do better", Harbage said.

Three years ago, the trio helped OSU Extension to revamp the book to include enough educational material to last 4-Hers through two or three project seasons, instead of one, like the old book. Another major change was the inclusion of illustrations that show the steps for tying different knot types.



Madison County resident Monroe Harbage lent his expertise as a state knots judge to the overhaul of the Ohio State University Extension's knots 4-H project book. The new book is used by 4-Hers throughout Ohio and in other states across the nation.

"For the project, kids have to tie 10 knots. The old

book only had five in it, and kids had to go find information on the other five on their own", Harbage said.

The book shows users practical applications, like surgeon's knots (good for stitches), square knots (good for tying shoes), and halter knots (good for tying cattle to fences). It also includes decorative applications such as knots used in macramé.

"We recommend practical knots to start out", Harbage said. "If a 4-Her comes back to the project a second year, we encourage them to try macramé, something beyond just rope knots."

At the state fair, exhibitors can choose the 10 knots they tie for competition from among 175 different knots displayed on a demonstration board.


"With 10 knots, you're just skimming the surface of possibilities", Harbage said.

Ohio's revamped knots project book has garnered attention across state lines. Extension offices throughout the United States use it in their 4-H programs. Harbage said it is not uncommon for states to share materials in this way.

Sealing threads to stop the drip over the years I have discovered that a very light application of a nonhardening sealer to the threads of things like the fuel shut-off valve, the little plug on the base of the carburetor, the fuel line going into the carburetor and the fuel filter (apply to the ferrule, not the threads), and the oil drain plug can stop the annoying drips that seem to come off of each of them. Any time you have a bolt going into a part of the engine where oil or water is on the other side, put a little nonhardening sealer on the threads. Even places with a gasket will benefit from a light coating of sealant on the gasket surfaces.



For years I have used "Permatex Form-a-Gasket #2 (non-hardening sealer)" for this purpose. This stuff is not a silicon "gasket in a tube". It is non-hardening, it stays pliable, so it comes apart at a later time without messing everything up. Don't use their #1 sealant; it dries up like super glue. Jim Cannon

A[®] Word on Fashion

Two of the most iconic fashions of the 1920's are the cloche hat and the flapper dress. The cloche hat of the 1920s evolved from the wider-brimmed hats of the decade before, and continued to evolve up until the 1930s and beyond. The basic description of the cloche hat is that it is a very snugfit hat that was often worn tilted, covering the forehead. vet allowing room for vision. The hair



was often cut short and styled flat to fit under these types of hats. Cloche type hats often covered the ears as well, and even sometimes the ends of women's short haircuts of the time. Often the flapper style clothing and the cloche hat were worn together, especially during the latter half of the Decade.





This month's "Flapper of the Month" features Bebe Daniels. Bebe started her movie career with the "Selig Polyscope Company," and later moved to the "Hal Roach's studios" in 1915 at the age of fourteen. During her stay at Roach's studio she made over 200 short subject silent films. By 1919, she was working at the Paramount Studios. By 1924, she was playing opposite Rudolph Valentino. Bebe married Ben Lyons in 1930 and they retired to England only to star in their own show for BBC "Life with the Lyons" in the 50's. On March 16, 1971, Daniels died of a cerebral hemorrhage in London at the age of 70.
