Using the exhaust gas of the automobile to clean the upholstery is the accomplishment of a recently invented device. An aluminum attachment is fastened to the exhaust pipe and the engine is allowed to As the exhaust idle. gas passes through this device suction is created at the inlet hole. Collected by a

nozzle, the dust and dirt are dawn though the hose and expelled into the air at the rear of the car. It is made in three models, for cars of different size.

With the car's engine idling, gas from the exhaust creates a vacuum that cleans the cushions.


New Business included the following:

A Word About Our National Organization

Over the past few years, we've had quite a few new members join our club. We sometimes forget to take the time to explain to them about the national organization we belong to. First of all, there are two major national Model "A" organizations in the country. One is called the Model "A" Ford Club of America (MAFCA). The second one is called the Model "A" Restorers Club (MARC). Both national organizations are made up of local Model "A" clubs. MAFCA calls the clubs that belong to their

organization "chapters". MARC calls the clubs that belong to their organization "regions". The Scioto Model "A" Ford Club has been a member of MARC for 52 years. Our MARC name is the Central Ohio Region. Although not required, our members are encouraged to join the national organization. As a member of MARC, you will receive a bi-monthly edition of their magazine, the Model "A" News. You are eligible to attend their yearly membership meetings, national meet and yearly tour. You are also eligible to participate in their mileage program.

Mark Your Calendars



How to Determine Your Rear End Ratio

Park on a flat surface with several feet of clear space in front. Remove all four spark plugs. Put a chalk mark on a rear tire at 6 o'clock. Mark the front of the crank pulley at 12 o'clock. With the help of a friend, and the transmission in high gear, push the vehicle forward and watch the mark on the crank pulley. Count the number of times the mark on the pulley reaches 12 o'clock and stop when the tire mark is at 6 o'clock again. Note the position of the mark on the crank pulley. The mark you made will be at approximately the area of the gear ratio as shown. With a standard 3.78:1 rear end gear, the crank pulley will



have made three complete revolutions, then a little past 3/4 of a turn. With a 4.11:1 rear end gear, the crank pulley will have made 4 1/8 revolutions. Dan Ritt, Mt. Arab, Ohio


****A** Word on Fashion**

As much fun as the beach can be, there was a time when wearing a bathing suit meant a woman could be arrested or warranted for indecent exposure. Swimsuits were said to be sinful according to the Vatican; they were even banned in the United States for decades.

In the 1900s, there were laws put in place to ensure people were modest when it came to the way they dressed. At that time, it was required for women to wear a long, one piece bathing suit, with stockings as well. As swimming and other beach activities became more popular, people started to push the limits of those laws.



In 1922, if you wore a bathing suit that was too short, you could receive a warrant from the police. They even had "bathing suit" patrolmen who would measure to see if a bathing suit was of proper length standards. Bathing suits back then could not be more than 6 inches above the knees.





The creator of "the Shimmy" was a voluptuous dancer born Marianna Michalska of Poland. Her parents died tragically and her foster-parents brought her to the U.S. at the age of 8 in 1909. She later changed her name to Gilda Gray. After singing in Chicago saloons and working as a cabaret dancer in New York, she appeared in the Ziegfeld Follies of 1922. She made her first film in 1923. This photo features Gilda in the 1926 silent comedy "Aloma of the South Seas". The film grossed over 3 million dollars and was the fourth most successful film of the 1920s. The film is now considered to be a lost film. Gilda died of food poisoning at the age of 58 in1959.
