December 12th - 11:00 a.m. Christmas Party Der Dutchman Restaurant, 445 S Jefferson Ave, Plain City, Ohio
















Convenient Replacement Parts

****A** Word on Fashion**

What fabric was used in the 1930s? Cotton broadcloth for day dresses. Silk or rayon crepe for afternoon frocks. Sheer rayons for blouses and summer party dresses. Linen for summer suits and dresses. Wool for winter suits and outerwear. Rayon tweed or corduroy for fall/winter dresses. Silky satin, lace, velvet, and taffeta for evening gowns.

1930s fashion colors were lovely pastels in spring and summer and rich earth tones in fall-winter. Peach and aqua were new favorite warm season colors not seen in the '20s. In fall, burgundy/maroon made reappearance. The 1930s were a colorful time, there was almost no color left out.

This month we feature Dorothy Gish, who was born in 1898 in Dayton, Ohio. Dorothy was born into a broken family where her restless father was frequently absent. Mary Gish, her mother, had entered into acting to make money to support the family. As soon as Dorothy and her sister Lillian Gish were old enough, they became part of the act. In 1912 they met fellow child actress Mary Pickford, and she got them extra work with Biograph Pictures. Dorothy would go on to star in over 100 two-reel films and features over the years. While she would excel in pantomime and light comedy, her popularity would always be overshadowed by that of her sister Lillian, who was considered to be one the silent screen's greatest stars. Dorothy only made a handful of movies in the 1920s. In 1926, Dorothy moved to England. Her last silent film was in1927. In 1928 Dorothy would retire from the screen and enjoy a long career on the stage. Dorothy died in 1968 in Rapallo, Italy, where she had been a patient for two years to treat hardening arteries. In 1976, the Dorothy and Lillian Gish Film Theater was dedicated on the Bowling Green State University campus.
