
August is going to be a very busy month for the club, so be sure and check the calendar often. I look forward to having you join us for as many events as possible.

### **BACKYARD TECH TIP**



### STARTING YOUR MODEL "A"



While each Model "A" has its own starting sequence, none of them will start well by just yanking out the choke rod & holding it out for 5 or 10 seconds while the engine cranks. The Model "A" has a gravity fuel system on a low compression engine which means it is easily flooded by too much choke. Turn the key on and fully retard the spark (up). Turn the GAV out 1 turn, hold the clutch in and move the hand throttle until you see the gas pedal move. Then step on the starter button. Let the motor crank for at least 3 - 4 seconds before you pull the choke rod. Then, don't hold it out for more than 2 or 3 seconds. If you find out it will not start without excessive choking, you have problems. As stated, all Model "A"s seem to have their own little quirks and unique starting sequence, but this is the standard procedure to start a typical, good running Model "A" Ford.

#### Men's Hats

For much of the twentieth century, a man's hat was his identity. He bought it, shaped it, creased it, handled it, and placed it on his head just right. A hat had as much personality as its owner. His hat stayed with him at all times, or else was lost or stolen off a public hat rack. His hat caused him to pay out more tips to hat check girls then it was worth, and could cause bodily harm if the wrong hat was worn on the wrong day. To wear a hat was often more trouble than it was worth for the sake of just being in fashion. While the 1920s saw a decline in hat use, it was still considered a necessary part of a man's wardrobe by the popular majority.

### FLAPPER of the MONTH







This month we feature Pola Negri. Pola was born in Poland in 1897. She and her mother lived in poverty after her father was arrested by the Russians and sent to a Siberian prison camp. As a teenager, Pola auditioned and was accepted to the Imperial Ballet. As a ballerina, she showed great promise until she contracted tuberculosis and was forced to cut short her dance career. Pola then auditioned for the Warsaw Imperial Academy of Dramatic Arts and became a theatre actress. As a stage star, her life changed again with the advent of World War I. Once again, she and her mother were plunged into poverty so she turned to film. By the time the war ended, her film career was established. After one of her films was released in the US, she was given a contract to make films in Hollywood. She was doing very well until she made a spectacle of herself when, during the funeral of Rudolph Valentino, she threw herself on his coffin. Fans felt she was acting in public and began to turn away from her. At that time, sound pictures were coming into vogue and her thick Polish accent also hurt her career. Pola returned to Europe and made films under Nazi management. In 1941 she once again came to America, penniless. She became an American citizen in 1951. Her last movie was in 1964. Pola died of pneumonia in Texas in 1987.
