






## **Robbins Crossing Historical Village Tour**

## TURN THE KEY OFF!



## Presenting The FLAPPER of the MONTH



This month we feature Mary Astor. Mary was born on May 3, 1906 in Quincy, Illinois. Her parents recognized Mary's beauty, so they pushed her into various beauty contests. One of those contest came to the attention of Hollywood moguls who signed her at the age of 14. Throughout 1921-1923 she continued her career with minor roles in a number of motion pictures. In 1924, Mary landed a role opposite John Barrymore. This launched her career to stardom. Mary was the new cinematic darling with each film packing the theaters. By the end of the twenties, the sound revolution had taken a strong hold on the industry and Mary was one of those lucky actresses who made the transition to "talkies" because of her voice and strong screen presence. In 1938, Mary turned out five feature films which kept her busy and in the spotlight. By 1941, her star began to fade. Because of three divorces, the death of her first husband who died in a plane crash, alcoholism, a suicide attempt, and a persistent heart condition, Mary got smaller roles in movies. Mary appeared in a total of 123 motion pictures with her final film in 1964. Mary lived out her remaining days confined to the Motion Picture Country Home, where she died of a heart attack on September 25, 1987 at the age of 81.
