

Our final tour for 2022 will be held on Saturday, October 22<sup>nd</sup>. We will be visiting two locations. We will first visit the Slate Run Living Historical Farm, located outside of Canal Winchester. This will be a self-guided tour that will allow you to witness farm work and family life of the 1880's. We will learn how the farm family carried out their daily chores and worked hard to raise numerous livestock and crops. They still prepare food on a wood burning cook stove, make clothes on the treadle sewing machine and light the home with kerosene lamps. There is a bit of walking involved to see the farm, but there are some picnic tables next to the parking lot and some benches at the farmhouse. The timeframe is about 1 hour for this tour. Our next stop will be the historical Wagnalls Memorial Library in Lithopolis. A one hour guided tour will be provided by Carol Gaal who portrays Mable Wagnalls. This library was dedicated in 1925 by Miss Mable Wagnalls in honor of her parents Adam and Anna Wagnalls, who were born in log cabins in Lithopolis. This library was once called "The finest Tudor-Gothic structure in America". After the tour, we will be heading to lunch and making a stop for ice cream. A starting time and meeting place has not yet been determined, so watch your email for additional information. This should be a great tour to finish off the 2022 season!




An outside view of Frank Lloyd Wright's Wescott House, located in Springfield, Ohio.

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



## **BACKYARD TECH TIP**



Just because your headlights come on and your starter turns does not mean you have sufficient battery voltage to power the ignition. You can string flashlight batteries together and get 6 volts; will that start your A? This is where a digital volt meter and a hydrometer come in handy. A fully charged battery should read 6.32 volts with specific gravity at 1.265 in each cell. A battery at 50% charge will read 6.12 volts with a specific gravity of 1.190. And, at 6.03 volts and a specific gravity of 1.155, you only have a 25% charged battery. You need a strong battery to spin the starter, engage the Bendix and provide voltage to the coil. As



the battery gets weaker, the first thing to fail is your spark. The more current you use to spin the starter, the less current you will have for the ignition. Old Dominion Model "A" Ford Club


# **\*\*A\*\* Word on Fashion**

## **Rolled Stockings**

Stockings came to about the mid or upper thigh and had to be held up by garter clips attached to either a corset or a girdle with clips or gilt mounts. It was also common for young women who didn't like to wear girdles to "roll" their stockings down, using a ribbon or elastic garter band to just above the knee – a trick that wasn't easy to master. Young women were fixing their rolls several times a day. Flappers were known to roll their stockings to down below the knee, and just to make sure you noticed that their knees were bare, they applied a little rouge makeup to make their knees look rosy. Why? Because women were not supposed to be seen with



bare legs, and this little glimpse of skin was such a Jazz Age kind of thing to do! There was a brief fad for girls to paint a picture of their boyfriend on their knee, or perhaps a favorite movie star.





This month we feature Edna Purviance. Edna was born in1895 in Paradise Valley, Nevada. Edna moved in with her married sister while attending college in San Francisco in 1913. In 1915, Edna was working as a secretary when actor and director Charlie Chaplin was working on his second film, just outside of San Francisco. He was looking for a leading lady when one of his associates noticed Edna at Tate's Café in San Francisco and thought she should be cast. Edna won the role. Chaplin and Edna were romantically involved from 1915 to 1917. The romance ended suddenly when Edna read a newspaper report of Chaplin having married 16-year-old. Edna appeared in 33 Chaplin productions. Her last appearance in a Chaplin film was also her first leading role. The film was not a success and effectively ended her career. She appeared in two more films, one which Chaplin never released and a French film released in 1927. Edna married an airline pilot in 1938. They remained married until his death in 1945. Chaplin kept Edna on his payroll. She received a small monthly salary from Chaplin's film company until she got married. The payments resumed after her husband's death. Edna died of throat cancer in 1958. "How could I forget Edna?" Chaplin responded to an interviewer after her death. "She was with me when it all began."
