Thank you again to the membership for allowing me to serve as your President, I have thoroughly enjoyed it! See you on the road again in 2023!



Brooke is 13, lives in Elkhorn, Wisconsin, and is the third generation Model "A" owner in her Model "A" family. She, her parents, and her grandparents are members of the Wisconsin Chapter of the Model "A" Ford Club of America (MAFCA).

Brooke writes: "I've been in the club since I was born. I like Model "A"s because we do fun things and events in them. My parents help run club events....I like to help set up kids' events, help set up meetings and help the other kids at events."

Brooke has a 1928 Sedan which the previous owner transformed into a Pickup. Brooke and her father ran it well enough that she learned to drive around the property. If Brooks decides to keep the pickup, the engine will need rebuilding, she will need a complete new interior, not to mention the essential items of good tires, brakes, and window glass. However, Brooke does have her eye on a Model "A" Coupe with a rumble seat, so time will tell which car she chooses to pursue!

With her dad's help, Brooke hopes to complete a Model "A" for herself by 2024, when she will turn 15, and can receive her temporary driver's license.






BACKYARD TECH TIP

Model "A" club, so take advantage of it. There is a wealth of knowledge within our membership. There are also a lot of guys eager to lend a hand.



Back in the 20's, stockings came in sizes 8.5 to 10, which was a number that reflected the shoe size. There was little stretch to them and they tended to bag at the ankles. For stout ladies (plus sizes) "out size" stockings were offered in wide leg widths. The sheerer the stockings were, the more hair was seen underneath. (Uh oh, time to shave those legs.) Shaving underarms had been in practice for several decades already, but legs were something new. Some stocking advertisers said "smooth legs and smooth stockings" go hand in hand while others said stockings do a find job of covering up unsightly leg hair. This month we feature Theda Bara. Theda, the daughter of a local tailor, was born in Cincinnati as Theodosia Goodman in 1885. After high school, she pursued her dream of acting. By 1908, she was in New York searching for roles. In 1911 she joined a touring company. After returning to New York in 1914, she was hired as an extra. Her ability to take direction helped her gain the lead role as the "vampire" later that year, and "The Vamp" was born. It was a well-deserved break, because Theda was almost 30 years old, at a time when younger women were always considered for lead roles. She became the screen's first fabricated star. Publicists sent out press releases that Theda was the daughter of an artist and an Arabian princess. She allowed herself to be photographed with snakes and skulls. Theda's second film was later that year for the newly formed Fox Studios. Theda was hot property now and made six more films in 1915. The next year she made eight films, all of which made a great deal of money for Fox Films. In 1917, Fox Films and Theda both headed to California. That year she starred in the mega-hit, Cleopatra. After seven films in 1919, her contract was terminated by Fox and her career never recovered. In 1921 she married director Charles Brabin and retired. Theda Bara died of abdominal cancer at the age of 69 in 1955.
