The Chief's **Corner**


We're off and running!!




The original building was built in 1908. The building was renovated and currently features a 1930s art deco design and features a Mayan themed marquee.



Auto Wash Bowls of the Roaring 1920s

The Auto Wash Bowl concept originated in St. Paul, Minnesota. It was patented in 1921 by inventor C.P. Bohland, who opened two locations in St. Paul. He devised the bowl as an easy way to clean mud off of the undercarriage of cars. Back in this early age of motoring, roads were often unpaved and muddy, and that mud would get caked on the underside of the car and the wheels — but a spin in the nifty Auto Wash Bowl took care of that. The nearly 80-foot-wide, ridged concrete bowl was about 16 inches at its deepest point in the center. Customers paid 25¢ to an attendant who strapped a protective rubber cover over the radiator. Patrons would then enter the bowl via a ramp and drive their cars around and around the bowl at a speed of about 10 miles per hour. The ridges in the concrete would vibrate the car and the water, creating a sloshing action that helped wash away all the mud from the chassis and wheels. The process took about three or four minutes. The car would then exit the bowl where patrons who wanted a complete car wash could enter one of the bays where the rest of the car would be cleaned. On a busy Saturday, about 75 cars per hour would go for a spin in the Auto Wash Bowl. Once the idea had proved successful in St. Paul, the patent holder began advertising in other cities to franchise the operation. The first Auto Wash Bowl in Chicago was built by C.G. Burkhartsmeier on the city's North Side. Burkhartsmeier bought the rights in 1924 and built his bowl and service station at a cost of \$20,000. Sadly, the Auto Wash Bowl wound up being little more than a novelty as carwashing technology evolved. Just two years later, the North Side wash bowl was bought by a local realtor, the South Side wash bowl was gone by the '30s, and the Auto Wash Bowl went down the drain...

BACKYARD TECH TIP



AIR CLEANER CAN RUIN YOUR ENGINE?

All carburetors released by Ford for use on the Model "A" and "B" engines had the float bowls externally vented. The Zenith Carburetor Company warned of the negative effects of using an air cleaner on early Ford vehicles with externally vented float bowls. The use of an air cleaner of any type will negatively affect the air to fuel ratios as the filter gets dirty. Even with the proper jetting, the carburetor will end up being very rich. The excessive fuel going


in the engine will end up doing much more damage than the dust in the air by washing the oil from the cylinder walls. These carburetors were not designed for air cleaner use. To allow the use of an air cleaner, the bowl vent must be plugged and relocated to the inside of the carburetor near the choke plate area so that the engine can only get its air from one source. This is called a pressure balancing circuit. It would take a lifetime to wear out an engine with the little bit of dust that's on our roads today.

A* Word on Fashion

The development of a more convenient, modern female wardrobe was a major trend of the 1920s and was achieved through the progressive simplification of dress as the decade advanced - a rejection of formality and multiple layers, in favor of comfort and a lighter, more natural effect. This simplicity created the popular tubular "la garçonne" look that dominated much of the decade. Also known as the flapper, the look typified 1920s dress with a dropped waist and creeping hemlines that could be created in economical fabrics. Coco Chanel helped popularize this style and was a prominent designer during the period. Both waistlines and hemlines followed similar, though inverse, projections throughout the decade, as waistlines dropped until 1923 before beginning to rise again in 1928; while hemlines rose until 1926, when they started to fall again.





The Windshield Wiper

Even the most commonplace devices in our world had to be invented by someone. Take the windshield wiper. It may seem hard to imagine a world without windshield wipers, but there was one, and Mary Anderson lived in that world. In 1902, Anderson was visiting New York City.


She was riding a streetcar and it was snowing, says the Rev. Sara-Scott Wingo, Anderson's great-great-niece. Wingo says while Anderson was riding the streetcar that snowy day, she observed that the streetcar driver had to get out and continually clean off the windshield. Naturally, that caused delays, and got Anderson wondering, what if there were some sort of blade that could wipe off the windshield without making the driver get out of the streetcar?

Anderson went back to Birmingham, made a sketch of her device, and wrote up a description of it. Then she applied for a patent. The patent application describes how the wiper was to be operated by a handle inside the vestibule of the motor car, and be easily removable — "thus



leaving nothing to mar the usual appearance of the car during fair weather," according to patent language. The application was filed June 18, 1903. On November 10, 1903, the United States Patent Office awarded Anderson patent number 743,801 for her Window Cleaning Device.

Wingo says her great-great-aunt tried to interest manufacturing firms in making this device for the emerging motorcar industry, but got no takers. A letter from the firm of Dinning and Eckenstein is one of her prized possessions. "Dear madam," the letter begins, "We beg to acknowledge receipt of your recent favor with reference to the sale of your patent. In reply,



we regret to state we do not consider it to be of such commercial value as would warrant our undertaking its sale." She doesn't know for **Anderson's** why sure invention never went anywhere, but she suspects it might have been because Anderson was such an independent She woman. didn't have a father, she didn't have a husband, and she didn't have a son, Wingo said. And the world was kind of run by men back then.

It doesn't seem as if Mary Anderson was the sort of woman to be crushed by the rejections. She lived another 50 years, long enough to see windshield wipers become ubiquitous.

FLAPPER of the MONTH







This month we feature Anita Page. Anita was born in 1910 in New York. Page was spotted by a man who was interested in representing actors. With the encouragement of her mother, Page telephoned the man who arranged a meeting for her at Paramount Studios. After doing a screen test, Page was offered contracts by Paramount and MGM. Page chose MGM and did her first film in 1928. She was the leading lady to Lon Chaney, Buster Keaton, Robert Montgomery, Clark Gable and others. During the early 1930s, she was one of Hollywood's busiest actresses. She was involved romantically with Gable briefly during that time. At the height of her popularity, she was receiving more fan mail than any other female star, with the exception of Greta Garbo. When her contract expired in 1933, she announced her retirement from acting at the age of 23. She retired as she was denied a pay rise. She made one more movie in 1936, and then retired fully from acting. She married Navy pilot Lieutenant House in 1937. They moved to Coronado, California and lived there until his death in 1991. Page died in her sleep at the age of 98 in 2008 at her Los Angeles home.
