
The Chief's **Corner**


Hello Everyone!

June Secretary's Report

Our Tech Meeting on June 7th was a real hit. Bill Minor, Martin Fitch, and Howard Turner had a good presentation on Model "A" Steering boxes. There were a lot of questions as well. Howard supplied pizza for the evening and some soft drinks. We had about 18 people who came to our meeting, including our new member, John Cleghorn. Our President, Wayne Davis, got our attention to get the meeting started and thanked Howard & Judy Turner for allowing us to use their garage for the meeting.

He went on to thank everyone who attended the Motts Military Museum Tour back on May 27th. He asked if anyone had been there before, and what they thought of the place. Everyone agreed they had no idea there was that much to be displayed. The museum was a lot larger than they thought it would be. It had a lot of artifacts from wars before WWI through the Korean War. He also thanked those who attended the Worthington Memorial Day Parade where Model "A" Amy made her debut for the Gearhart's. He explained how nice the parade was and that he had not seen that many people supporting a parade and our veterans in quite a while.

Treasurer Cheek was not able to attend our meeting, so President Davis went over the monthly report for the group.

There was no Sunshine Report.

Our Secretary, Pat Liston, did not have anything to add to the minutes. Everyone had just read them in the Scuttlebutt a few days before. However, she did pass out new name badges for the Cleghorn's.

President Davis then went over the upcoming events for June and July. We have a Tour of the Springfield Heritage Museum scheduled for June 17th. On July 5th, we have a Tech Meeting at Dick Liston's Garage. The topic will be welding. Dick Liston also has prepared a tour of the Miami Valley Steam Thrashers' Show on July 15th. He asked that everyone come to the fairgrounds on their own, and we should all be there between 9:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. They will be directing us to where we are to set up. He reminded us to bring our chairs and a tent for shade if we chose to do so.

Wayne explained that our Vice President was responsible for bringing the trustees together to discuss the issue. Whatever they recommend to the membership, the membership will still have to vote on it in order for it to become effective. Since Vice President Jones is on vacation in Texas, we will need to wait for his return before we can move forward with the subject.

He then turned the meeting over to Bill, Martin, and Howard, who as I stated earlier, did a great job of explaining how the Model "A" steering box works.

Our tour to the Springfield Heritage Museum started at the Der Dutchman in Plain City at 9:00 a.m. on June 17th. We had a very lovely day for our trip. We had seven cars and about a dozen members attending. The roads were lovely and the scenery was nice. We learned a lot about the city of Springfield. We then drove over to Clifton Mills to check it out. I understand that they light it up at Christmas time and it is a site that needs to be seen. We will have to come back for that. They offered a line of Model "A" kits at that time. It appears that some MARC members are buying up these old cars and racing them on a track similar to what the Boy Scouts use for their "Pinewood Derby" races. 




The Heritage Center Museum Tour

"A" Word on Fashion

Another trend for women that enjoyed massive popularity in the twenties was that of sportswear worn as daywear. Sportswear had long been an acceptable form of casual wear for men, but in the 1920s, it also became acceptable for women. The popularity of sports clothes in the 1920s is often attributed, like many of the most popular styles of the twenties, to Coco Chanel, but designers such as Jane Regny and Jean Patou also contributed to the sportswear trend. Patou's yellow skirt and sweater set show how much tennis clothes influenced design. Tennis was the most popular sport for women and thus the most popular inspiration for fashion. Indeed, one of the most popular fashion stars of the early twenties was tennis star Suzanne Lenglen whose short sleeved, pleated tennis dress and bandeau were created for her by Patou. Her style both on and off the court inspired the masses. Shrimpton writes, "By the late 1920s, following her lead and embracing wider fashion trends, sleeveless, knee-length shift-like tennis dresses were fashionable". So popular were elements of these sports clothes that in a 1928 issue of The Tatler, M.E. Brooke wrote, "Sports clothes have been developed to such an extent that they may go to lunch at the fashionable restaurants; as a matter of fact they are often worn until the hour of cocktail". fashionhistory.fitnyc.edu





BACKYARD TECH TIP



DOES YOUR RADIATOR SPEW?

The most common reason for a Model "A" to spew water out of the radiator is caused by over filling the radiator. Only add enough fluid to cover the core. It is not actually over heating; it is just spewing out the excess water. If the radiator is not overfilled and is overheating, check for low coolant, a loose fan belt, debris in the radiator fins or a stuck thermostat. A bad water pump will usually squeak or leak. The fan belt should have 1/2" of flex at themed-point; no more, or less. The Model "A" does not have a pressurized cooling system; normal operation will cause the coolant to evaporate. Check the coolant level every time you gas up.





This month we feature Billie Dove. Billie Dove was born Lillian Bohny in New York City in 1903. By 15, she was helping to support the family by working as a model. She could neither sing nor dance all that well, but her stunning beauty got her hired by Ziegfeld Jr. to appear in his famous Follies. A burgeoning affair between Dove and Ziegfeld prompted Ziegfeld's wife to arrange work for the young starlet in Hollywood. She made her first film in 1921. She was immediately put into a starring role in only her second picture. From there, Billie went on to appear opposite some of Hollywood's most popular leading men including Douglas Fairbanks, Lon Chaney, and Tom Mix. She married in 1923, but it ended in divorce in 1929. Billie was still at the peak of her popularity with the advent of sound. Howard Hughes became an obsessed admirer, which resulted in a three-year affair. Hughes actually proposed to the star and they were briefly engaged. She abruptly ended the relationship, however, when she was unable to handle his quirkiness. She retired in 1935 and got married for the second time to an oil executive. They were married for 35 years, until his death in 1970. She was married one more time, but it ended in divorce. She lived out her life in Woodland Hills, California, where she died of pneumonia in 1997 at the age of 94.
