
Wednesday, November 1<sup>st</sup>, will be a dinner meeting at which time we will be electing our 2024 officers. Details will be forthcoming.

#### **"A" W**ord on Fashion

#### Menswear

The most significant development in men's fashion during the 20's occurred in two unique kinds of trousers: the Oxford bags and the plus-fours. Oxford bags grew in popularity around 1924-25 when undergraduates at Oxford adopted these wide-legged trousers. Though the origin of the style is contentious, it is generally agreed that it derived from the trousers that rowers on Oxford's crew teams pulled on over their shorts, and you can see how "The Bystander" satirized this in 1924. The original style was about 22 inches wide at the bottom, several inches wider than the average men's trouser leg. Oxford undergraduates began wearing these around the university and soon the style spread. As the style spread, so too did the width of the trouser legs until at one point they reached up to 44 inches wide. The trousers were made out of flannel and came in a variety of colors. They were mostly worn by youths, perhaps the male counterparts of the



Flapper, and became a favorite of Britain's "Bright Young People," a group of wealthy, aristocrats known for their antics in London's nightlife.







#### **BACKYARD TECH TIP**



#### **ELECTRONIC IGNITION?**

Some Model "A" owners try to correct hard-to-start problems by installing an electronic ignition. Often a Model "A" that's hard to start on points will be just as hard to start on an electronic ignition system if the problem wasn't the points. All an electronic ignition system does is replace the points and condenser. electronic ignition does not give you higher spark voltage, eliminate maintenance on your ignition system, or give enough of a horsepower boost to cause the car to do wheelies. It replaces the points. That's it. It will not correct or overcome other major problems in the



ignition system. While it will give you more horsepower and improve your fuel economy, both would be so insignificant as to be hardly noticeable on a 40 horsepower engine. As the analogy goes, putting electronic ignition on an 85+ year old car is like putting 12" woofers on your grandfathers 78 rpm Victrola and expecting it to sound like surround sound. While it is certainly true that an electronic ignition system is superior when compared to a points ignition system, that's beside the point. The question is the practical applicability of an electronic ignition on an 85+ year old, 40 horsepower, low compression, low rpm engine. The key advantage to an electronic ignition system is that you do not need to gap & lube the points every year or replace them every four to five years. If your distributor is within specs, you perform annual maintenance on the points, and change them every four years or so using quality parts, you will see no difference whatsoever between a points ignition system or an electronic ignition system on a Model "A". The key disadvantages to an electronic ignition on a Model "A" are the initial costs, it will not work with a low battery voltage, and it is easily damaged beyond repair by polarity reversal and other common mistakes, and it could leave you stranded on the roadside unless you opt to carry a spare electronic ignition module. If you have a well running car and just don't care to fool with the points anymore, an electronic ignition is a perfect alternative. If you expect an electronic ignition to cure any significant ignition problem you may have other than bad points, it won't. This is the question you need to answer: "If tens of thousands of other Model "A"s operate just fine on a 6-volt system with points, why can't mine?" **Bruce Haynes**


#### How the Model "A" Came to have a Zenith Carburetor

In April of 1927, Harold Hicks was called from his work in aircraft engineering to a meeting with Edsel Ford and Rough production bosses, Charles Sorensen and Peter Martin. They showed Hicks a 203 cubic inch displacement engine that was only developing twenty-two horsepower. They asked him how much he could get out of the engine.

After a few calculations, Hicks told them that he could get forty horsepower and that it would take about three weeks to do the job. Given the assignment, Hicks, working closely with Carl Schultz, concentrated on changing the manifold and carburetor. He also opened up the passages around the exhaust valves and changed the shape of the gasket.

Within three weeks, the engine was developing the promised forty horsepower. After exhaustive dynamometer testing, even Henry Ford was convinced that Hicks had kept his promise.

To achieve his results, Hicks had used a standard Zenith

carburetor, which was held together by fourteen small screws. Finally, Charles Sorensen said, "Get the Zenith company in here for a final design". Henry Ford said he didn't want the carburetor to have the test model's fourteen screws. Zenith changed the design and made it so it was held together by only two bolts. Henry said that was too many, and so the Model "A" carburetor came to be held together by only one bolt.



# FLAPPER of the MONTH







This month we feature Betty Blythe. She was born in1893 as Elizabeth Blythe Slaughter in Los Angeles. Betty had shortened her name to Betty Blythe when she and three other women posed for a photo shoot of the newest swim fashion for women, a bathing suit. Previously, women were expected to wear stockings with full dresses or skirts into the water. Blythe worked in vaudeville singing songs. In 1915, she had an unbilled part for Famous Players Film Company. After her first Vitagraph Studios role in 1917, she was given a leading role in a 1918 film. As famous for her revealing costumes as for her dramatic skills, she became a star in such exotic films as "The Queen of Sheba" in 1921 wearing nothing above the waist except a string of beads. She continued to work as a character actress. One of her later roles was a small, uncredited role in a crowd scene in 1964's "My Fair Lady". Blythe was married to a movie director from 1919 until his death in 1954. She reportedly made \$3.5 million when she sold a section of land that is now part of the Sunset Strip. She lost her fortune in the 1929 stock market crash. She died of a heart attack in Woodland Hills, Los Angeles, in 1972 at the age of 78.
