### **BACKYARD TECH TIP**



### ARE YOU WATCHING YOUR AMMETER?

An ammeter is a gauge that measures electric current in "amperes". Amperes, often shortened to "amp", is a unit of electric current. While volts and amperes are both measures of electricity, the difference is that amps measure electric current and volts measure the pressure that's moving the electricity through a circuit.

Model "A" ammeters are a center off type meter. With no current flowing through it (off position), the needle sits on zero in the center. If something is using current in your electrical system, the needle points to the negative side. If the generator or alternator

is charging the battery, the needle points to the positive side. If the same amount of charge being produced is being used by the horn or lights, etc., the needle will set on "0". Henry Ford considered the ammeter as an important diagnostic tool. Here are a few ways to use it as such:



- 1. The ammeter will show a small discharge when the brake pedal is pushed down, indicating the brake light is working.
- 2. When the lights are on or the horn is sounded, watch the ammeter. It will mirror the amount of amps being use to do those things.
- 3. When the starter motor cranks the engine, the ignition breaker points open and close, so with current flowing in the ignition coil, each time the points close, they cause a the needle to flutter. By

watching this, you know that the ignition breaker points are working, the timing gear is okay, and the low voltage part of the ignition circuit is complete, without even opening the hood!

When you are parking your Model "A", always take a final look at the ammeter after shutting the engine off, but before turning off the key. If you see a discharge, you have a switch somewhere that failed to turn off and you may return to a dead battery!

These are just a few examples of ways to use this important gauge that is sitting on your dashboard, but there are lots more to discover as you learn your Model "A" electrical system.

### <u>Pequaming, Michigan</u> & HENRY FORD



Pequaming is an unincorporated community in Baraga County, Michigan. It is located on a narrow point of land that juts into Keweenaw Bay. Although still partially inhabited, Pequaming is one of the largest ghost towns in the Upper Peninsula.

In 1877, Charles Hebard and Edward Thurber decided to start a lumber mill. Together, they purchased a large tract of land on Keweenaw Point, Michigan, due to its deep, protected harbor and easy access to



timber. The mill operated under the name of Hebard and Thurber until the partnership was dissolved and Hebard became the sole proprietor. At its peak, the company employed nearly one thousand employees with two hundred men working in the mill, three hundred in the surrounding woods, and the rest working throughout the town. It was regarded as a lumberman's paradise. The town included the mill, a company store, offices, boarding houses, hotel, livery stable, a bowling alley, bath houses, churches, schools, parks, a band and orchestra, ice rink, and over 100 houses. The Pequaming mill was the first large-scale lumbering and milling operations in the Lake Superior region. The original sawmill operated until 1887, when it burned in a fire of unknown origins and was replaced by a larger mill within 60 days.




Pequaming, Michigan in the early 1900's.

In 1922, the Hebards were approached by Ford Motor Company, who wanted to purchase their timber only. Mindful of Pequaming's future, the Hebards convinced Ford to purchase the mill and the surrounding town as well. In September of 1923, the Ford Motor Company purchased the mill and town for \$2,850,000. The purchase price included the double band sawmill, the lath and shingle mills, forty thousand acres of timber land, thirty thousand board feet of lumber, three million board feet of cut logs, the town land & buildings, the railroad, and the towing & water equipment. Renovations began immediately, which included removing the lath and shingle mills, dismantling the old burner, and adding a new powerhouse. After repairs and refitting, the sawmill reopened with a work force that received \$5 per day for an eight-hour shift instead of the previous \$3.50 for a longer day. *(continued)*

By February of 1925, Ford had connected the Hebard railroad to the Ford railroad in L'Anse, allowing each plant to specialize in one type of wood. Lumber from the Pequaming mill was generally shipped by water to plants in Dearborn, Edgewater, and Chester, mostly in the form of crating lumber. The better grades of lumber were sent by rail to Iron Mountain for use in the auto manufacturing plants. During its peak, the sawmill provided flooring for floorboards, truck boxes, and wood panels for station wagons. By 1933, car sales had decreased enough due to the Great Depression, that the demand for lumber was nearly nonexistent. As the mill was idled during that period, Henry Ford created other work for residents by establishing a cooperative farm east of town. As an additional measure, the company store adjusted its food prices and donated clothing and shoes to employees and their families. During the school year, Ford's summer home was used as a vocational school that he established. He also opened four one-room elementary and intermediate schools in 1935. In 1937, the company built a high school, which contained state-of-the-art home economics, food & clothing labs, and a library. It also featured the first fluorescent lights used in a Michigan school.

After the United States entered World War II, the company's ships were diverted, which resulted in the lumber being trucked to L'Anse and then shipped by rail. However, a shortage of truck tires and increased shipping costs prompted the company to close the mill in late 1942.

#### **Boy's Wear**

Like girls' clothing, the length of a boys' trouser was determined by his age. Young boys wore shorts with a tunic or sweater, while older boys began wearing long trousers, often with similar tops. Like men, Fair Isle sweaters and blazers were popular for young boys, with blazers often a required component of a school uniform. Like both womenswear and menswear, boys' clothing was inspired by sportswear as the flannel trousers and woolen blazers of cricket and tennis became acceptable daywear for boys. Uniforms were literally topped off with caps that looked inspired by cricket.

The most important development in babywear during the decade was the rise of the romper, which we might now refer to as a onesie. An example can be seen on the smallest model in the picture. Shrimpton writes, "Rompers, first offered by Harrods in 1919, were revolutionary new garments - like small boiler suits, they had long sleeves, a yoked bodice and short




knickerbockers. Made in plain, easily laundered fabrics, these were convenient for mothers and enabled much more freedom of movement, for babies at the crawling stage and toddlers, than traditional cumbersome petticoats."


### Over 65 Years of Fun!

## Presenting The FLAPPER of the MONTH





This month we feature Marguerite De La Motte, who was born in1902 in Duluth, Minnesota. Her family moved to San Diego in 1913 after her father, a lawyer, was disbarred in Minnesota. She began her career as a dancer in Los Angeles and appeared at Graumann's Million Dollar Theater. She entered films in 1918. She played opposite Douglas Fairbanks in several films. In1919 her mother died following a car accident. Seven months later, her father died from heart disease. Producer J.L. Frothingham became her legal guardian. Marguerite had become a successful leading lady. She married actor John Bowers in 1924. In 1927 she signed a contract with Gotham Productions. Unfortunately, she had trouble making the transition from silent to sound films. During the 1930s, she appeared in only two movies. After that, she and her husband started performing in vaudeville together. John had a serious drinking problem and the couple eventually separated. In 1936, John committed suicide by drowning himself in the ocean. The film, A Star Is Born, was loosely based on his suicide. Marguerite remarried in 1939. Her final acting role was a bit part in 1942. In 1943 she filed for divorce claiming extreme mental cruelty. After the divorce, Marguerite moved to San Francisco and started working for the Red Cross. In March of 1950, she died of cerebral thrombosis at the age of forty-seven.
